**Sallie Portnoy** has for the 2nd year in a row won the invitation only non acquisitive Yeramba Estates Sculpture Award of \$3500 at the Central Coast Festival of Arts, which runs from March 11 – March 20 in Wyong, with her elegant glass piece 'Two Blades'.

The exhibition was opened by Governor of NSW Her Excellency Professor Marie Bashir AC. This year the festival is celebrating its 30th year, and it was also voted the best regional art show in NSW.

James Deas was the adjudicator for the sculpture award. He has been a fine arts dealer for over 35 years & has been Curator & adviser to the William Bowmore Collection for 35 years. His status in the art world is acknowledged by his position as Government appointed Valuar/ Assessor for the commonwealth Taxation Incentive for The Arts scheme.

**'Two Blades'**: In these pieces Portnoy is redefining the line while abstracting the form.

Her pieces are no longer figures or fish but capture the movement and sensuality of both. There is a metamorphosis going on which is clearly captured here. The glass plays with the light as it changes from thick to thin, as it absorbs and reflects the light, and as different colours mix when they are melted together.

Like the Sword in the Stone, the sword-like frond forms are plunged into their bases - grounded and earthbound, while their elegant forms reach up to the heavens, to a higher ground. The pieces are at once both male and female; at 'base' quite sexual and reflective of the basic nature of mankind. The figures speak of the conflict between opposing forces within us, between archaic impulses and new aspirations.

## Our New President. Roger McFarlane's Message

It is a great honour to be elected President of The Sculptors Society. I am looking forward to a greater involvement with the sculptors in our society. I would like to congratulate Margaret Sheridan for the excellent work she has done as President. Margaret has worked hard and successfully as President to further the interests of the Society and its members. It will be a hard act to follow.

When I was asked to stand for the President's position, one of the things making the nomination easy to accept was the calibre of the members on the committee. They all put in a huge effort to make things happen with a minimum of fuss and in a spirit of co-operation. They are all to be congratulated for the work they have done, and I look forward to working with them.

The Society, established in 1951, is the oldest sculpture society in Australia. In 1952 Lyndon Dadswell described the aim of the society as "the advancement of the understanding and appreciation of sculpture and the widest use and application of sculpture and its associated arts." These are still the

guiding influences of the Sculptors Society today. This is expressed in our current Statement of Purpose:

- To actively promote sculpture to the widest possible audience
- To actively promote the work of all member sculptors
- To provide a forum to disseminate information regarding sculpture and sculptors
- To hold regular exhibitions.

We live in a time when society does not join groups, but concentrates on individual achievement. To ensure that we continue to be relevant for the next 55 years is one of the challenges we need to address.

Each new president brings a different style and adds a new layer to the long history of the Society. I believe that I am the first President of the Society to come from outside the Sydney metropolitan area. With this in mind I bring a different perspective to the job.

I work on the basis of "If it's not broke don't fix it". I do not believe in making change for change's sake. What I

would like to achieve during my presidency is to build on our strengths, and make The Society more inclusive of country members and less Sydney-centric. This does not mean reducing what we do in Sydney, but creating more opportunities for country members. To this end I invite all members both city and country to supply input to the committee so as to improve the value of their membership. Being proactive strengthens the society so that it is in tune with and relevant to its membership.

I would like to see more members attending the Forums. The Forums not only have interesting speakers, but give members the opportunity to network with other members and to speak directly to myself and the members of the committee in a relaxed and informal atmosphere.

To conclude, I feel honoured to be elected President of the Sculptors Society. I will do my best to ensure that our membership continues to grow. I will also work towards making sure that membership of The Sculptors Society is rewarding on many levels.

## ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING - 3 MARCH 2005

### HON. TREASURER'S REPORT:

*Alan Mountfield of Sherley and Sherley, Chartered Accountants completed the audit of the Sculptors Society's financial statements and in his opinion, the balance sheet and profit and loss statements present fairly the financial position of The Sculptors Society and the result of its operations for the year ended 31 December 2004 are in accordance with the Australian Accounting Standards.*

*By way of summary the Society finished the year with an operating surplus. The Sculptors Society has had another good year and is in a strong financial position. The major source of income was membership subscriptions and commission received on sculpture sales.*

*Commission received this year was down due to less sales. It has been a tough year and although I'm not a forecaster, 2005 will similarly be a year full of challenges.*

*On the expenditure side of the ledger, your Committee has continued to maintain tight control which has resulted in the earlier mentioned surplus being achieved.*

*When considering the results, membership, exhibitions and exhibition sales are the key, and in 2004 your committee under*

*Margaret's leadership performed well.*

*With the President's permission, I now put the motion that the accounts be accepted and the auditor, Alan Mountfield be re-appointed for the year ended 31 / 12 / 2005.*

*In conclusion, I mention that I will not be nominating for the position of Hon. Treasurer this year but know that the Society finances will be in very good hands. I thank you all for allowing me to be part of the Society's activities which I hope to be able to continue in the future.*


### Welcome

We warmly welcome 2 new full members: Gunnel Watkins and Efat Yahyaoglu.


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Our Society was well represented at the Royal Easter Show this year, and we had several prize winners.

Glass. 300 x 300 x 150mm


Kay Alliband's *Fallen* is a sculpture she just had to do. She writes:

*It's been brewing in me for many years – but the form it would take only came to me last year when I was working on my mosaic "Falling Runners", a series of carpets seemingly falling out of the sky.*

*My youngest brother Kevin Hitchcock broke his neck when he fell from a rope swinging over the Hawkesbury River. This fall changed not only his life, but that of everyone connected with him. After 10 years he mustered the strength to write a book, 'Walk with me', about the experience.*

*Before the accident he was a journalist and Director of Channel 10 TV news. After the accident, writing this book using a computer became a mammoth physical effort but he stuck with it and eventually succeeded.*

*I made "Fallen" from winterstone pressed into a mesh form. Initially I had it hanging from the ceiling of my studio.*

*On one side I have written the account of his fall from the start of chapter 1 of the book 'Silence. From the time I let go of the rope swinging above the muddy brown water of the Hawkesbury River'.....to.....'You should know that because of this damage you will be a quadriplegic for the rest of your life.'*

*The writing was applied whilst the medium was still damp – fresco technique. This was the only way I could work out how to do it, i.e. to include the writing on a folded form. Once writing was on the damp winterstone I folded that section of the form, wired it together and moved on to the next section. It was a very time consuming piece but I just had to do it.*
